CORN FARMERS

Wisconsin farmers grow 9% of the nation's corn crop. If you grew and sold <u>Syngenta MIR 162</u> or your corn was cross-contaminated by it, you may have a claim to recover for lost farming profits.

National Grain Farmers Association estimates the conduct of Syngenta cost farmers upwards of \$2.9 billion by putting MIR 162 on the market before obtaining export approval from China. In 2014 China returned over 600,000 tons of corn claiming it did not meet Chinese standards for genetically modified corn. This resulted in a glut of the American corn market bringing prices for all farmers down. Midwest farmers as well as Cargill and ADM are suing Syngenta for their conduct.
